



CONFERNCE 2021

With all the uncertainty from COVID, the 2021 Conference Committee selected a theme of "Riding the Wave of Change in Environmental Education" and tried a new conference format: a hybrid



CHANGE IN VIRONMENTAL EDUCATION

The Conference kicked off with "NYSOEA Name That Tune," a virtual musical competition that had people laughing and singing all night. Two days of virtual workshops gave members new perspectives on everything from teaching about fossils to teaching about climate change, while the "Bonfire with the Elders" provided historical perspectives and sage advice for those just entering the outdoor education field. Those who weren't too tired by Friday night joined the fascinating "Climate Change and the Wine Industry" presentation. It's only a guess, but sales of Ben Goldfarb's entertaining book "Eager" probably rose following his enlightening talk about the benefits of beavers. And attendees will never look at bottled water the same way after Dr. Sherri Mason's keynote address about plastics pollution.

Saturday Educator Activity Exchanges fulfilled our craving for face-to-face interactions as we gathered at three nature centers across the state. The "Open Space" sessions at Montezuma Audubon and Five Rivers Environmental Education Center were so popular they may appear at future conferences!

Best of all, NYSOEA members gave back to NYS in multiple ways: the Bioblitz competition logged 893 observations of more than 300 species across New York State into iNaturalist, attendees "popped" honeysuckle for Montezuma Audubon, picked up trash at Jones Beach Energy & Nature Center, and collected non perishables for a Long Island food pantry.

ASSESS YOUR ALLYSHIP

by devoting time and energy to self-study and reflection on your biases. Maintain a student mentality, remain nonjudgmental, and actively listen when others are sharing. If you are struggling with discomfort, try journalling about your feelings or adopt a willing accountability buddy.

COLLABORATE AND CREATE

progressive programming that addresses environmental justice and racism through community engagement. Research and connect with BIPOC-led organizations to discuss their goals, ask how you can support them, and suggest resources or ideas to be of service to them.

INITIATE INCLUSIVITY

at your site through staff or educator trainings, diversity based programs, and best practices like use of pronouns, traditional land recognition, and accurate historical representations. Host or compensate partners to offer workshops on inclusive practices in education and the workplace.

PROMOTE COMMUNITY

who are addressing systemic racism, using your platform to elevate BIPOC voices and their work. Seek out and share infographics, podcasts, videos, articles, webinars, social media accounts, literature, and documentarie related to environmental racism.

SURVEY YOUR CONSTITUENTS

to determine what factors may deter or prevent certain demographics from visiting your site. Examples may include income, primary language, culture, transportation, or disability. Hold a community meeting to discuss how to address those barriers at a

of your site with the inclusive, accurate, and honest history of racial social, and environmental conflict in your region. Incorporate the stories o BIPOC in educational programs and materials. Do not shy away from difficult topics, but do present them with empathy for those affected

Advocate for the allocation of resources to diversity-based scholarships, camperships, internships, grants, and career pathways to increase exposure to the environmental field for people of color.
